Course Description

Benvenuti a italiano 121, and thank you for your interest in Italian! Italian 121 is the exciting first step in acquiring proficiency and comfort with Italian language and culture. This is not just a "language class." It is a gateway through which you will come to understand culture and the way language interacts with it. We'll delve into what it means to be Italian, what it means to be American, and understand how to discuss our cultural differences and similarities. We'll acquire the vocabulary to discuss identity, university life, free time, family/friends, technology and fashion. And we'll arm ourselves with the linguistic elements necessary to do so: the present and past tenses, a rich array of adjectives, and the most essential verbs to expressing yourself in Italian. In sum, we'll work together to develop what our World Language Department calls your intercultural competency, linguistic ability, and critical thinking for understanding Italian culture.

What to do with Italian at Elon:

- 1) The interdisciplinary <u>Italian Studies Minor</u> which counts courses from a variety of disciplines at Elon: History, Classics, American Studies, Theatre, Art History and more.
- 2) Study abroad in Italy for a semester in Florence or during Winter Term.
- 3) Design your own <u>Independent Major</u> in Italian.
- 4) **Have fun** while learning about a most fascinating world culture and beautiful language.

Course Goals. By the end of the course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas (the five C's): Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. Main objectives include:

1. Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns

- 2. Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies
- 3. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language
- 4. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Italian-speaking world
- 5. Ability to use technology for e-mail and research of selected topics in Italian
- 6. Ability to use the Supersite for oral and written practice of Italian

Grade Distribution

Participation and Attendance (15%); Homework (15%); Compositions (15%); Quizzes/*Prove* (10%); Unit Exams (25%); Oral Exams (10%); Reflection Journal (5%); Final Presentation (5%)

Participation and Attendance (15%) will be evaluated by several criteria: 1) Preparation: do you bring all materials to class every day; read/study all assigned pages <u>before</u> coming to class? 2) Language: do you <u>always</u> make the effort to speak Italian in the classroom, regardless of accuracy? 3) Participation: do you volunteer often and participate fully in a mature and thoughtful manner? 4) Group work: do you work well in groups and pairs—speak in Italian and stay on task? 5) Attitude: do you have a positive attitude in class and are you supportive of classmates and respectful of the language learning process? *Nota bene*: As a part of this grade, you must attend at least one conversation hour this semester.

Homework (15%) will be assigned from the online Activities Manual/WebSAM. There are two kinds of homework: preparatory (5%) and review (10%). Preparatory homework encourages you to look ahead at the coming week's topics. Preparatory homework is typically due each Sunday by 11.59pm. Review homework lets you practice the material we've already discussed in class during the week. Review should be done on a daily basis, but has a deadline of Saturday at 11.59pm.

There will be four in-class **Compositions** (15%). The instructions for each composition are on the Supersite. You are allowed to bring in an outline for each composition and use your book while writing it. The outline **cannot** contain: 1) complete sentences 2) conjugated Italian verbs 3) any English. The outline should be used as a way to gather your thoughts and ideas in preparation for the in-class writing process. It in no way should be a pre-written portion of the composition itself. Bring notebook paper to class the day of a composition and write legibly, and double- or triple-spaced. Each first draft composition will be marked with correction symbols, given a grade out of 50 and must be corrected within one week of getting the first draft back. The second draft must be typed with **corrections** made **BOLD** and <u>underlined</u>. You should turn in a printed copy along with your original in class. Then, you should upload the corrected draft on the Supersite. If all corrections are correctly addressed, you can get 50 more points for a final grade out of 100. If you do not turn in corrections, you receive the original score over 100.

Quizzes/*Prove* (10%) are situated halfway through each unit and give you the chance to check your progress with the material of a single "lezione." These quizzes can be found on the supersite and should be completed at home. They are considered open-note and open-book.

You will have 4 **Unit Exams (25%)** including a cumulative final (exam 4). Dates and material to be covered can be found in the course program below. You will complete the exams in class on your computers, so, be sure to *bring your laptop in class for each exam*.

You will complete three **Oral Exams** (10%) using the "Partner Chat" function of the WebSAM. You may choose your own partners and complete the exams whenever you like. Oral Exam 1 is due on September 30th; Oral Exam 2 is due on October 31st; and Oral Exam 3 is due on November 30th.

You will complete and upload to the Supersite four **Reflection Journal** (5%) entries based on your reading of Severgnini's *Ciao America!* and our in-class discussions of Italian language and culture. Journal entries must be between 250 and 500 words, in English, double-spaced. Use the Reflection Journal Template, found on the Supersite to structure your entries.

The **Final Presentation** (5%) will be a group video presentation based on a cultural theme. A prompt will be provided to you by your instructor.

Step 4 - Select a School

- Locate your school by typing your school's name, Elon University. To narrow the search results, add the city and state, Elon, NC, (include the country, if outside of the USA.) in which your school is located.
- Click "find." If the terms you entered did not result in a successful search, follow the on-screen tips to revise your search.

- Select your school from the list by clicking on its name.
- Click "select school" to add the school to your account.
- Look for a message at the top of the screen confirming you successfully added the school.

Step 5 - Select a Course/Class

From the list of available classes at your school for your textbook's Supersite, look for Instructor "Essary," "Pardini," or "Cerami" and the course "Italian 121 - Fall 2015" taught between 08/23/2015 and 12/14/2015. Your instructor's name might be listed after "Essary, ..."; this is normal. It might look something like this:



or

- Click the radio button for the course section your section. If more than one class is listed for your instructor, click the information icons in the class listings until you locate the section.
- Click Save. You should see a confirmation that you successfully enrolled in your instructor's course.
