Academic Learning Center (ALC)

The newly named Academic Learning Center (ALC) (formerly the Academic Achievement and Access Center) is the office at KU that provides Supplemental Instruction (SI), Tutoring Services, academic consultations, and academic success workshops. We work with faculty in a number of ways by: forming partnerships to provide SI in classes, seeking recommendations for both Tutor and SI Leader applicants, meeting with students to discuss strategies in learning course material, and presenting academic success workshops to classes by request. Our goal is to help you think through your pedagogy and use online learning tools that allow learners to engage with the course content, with the instructor, and with each other in meaningful ways. Instructional designers will advise you on best practices for course layout following Quality Matters standards and accessibility guidelines, and they will personalize their recommendations based on the unique needs of your course. Our e-learning support specialists will help you create online media such as video or audio recordings to enhance your course and further engage your students. CODL staff are working remotely, but we are scheduling virtual consultations to assist instructors who are ready to transition their content to flexible formats for the fall semester. Library instructors integrate research skills, information discovery, and critical evaluation of sources into courses and assignments in a variety of teaching modes. KU Libraries help students learn citation tools and good citation practice and support the use of Open Educational Resources (OER) and Open Pedagogy in a variety of ways. KU Libraries offer a number of video tutorials and subject and course guides to support research and assignments for courses and for information about copyright issues. KU Libraries will collaborate with fall 2020 instructors to meet a majority of library instruction objectives through various online methods. KU Writing Center

The KU Writing Center (KUWC) supports instructors by providing assistance to the undergraduate and graduate student writers enrolled in their courses. We encourage instructors to refer their students to the KUWC for a one-on-one writing consultation – if you recommend it, students will come! During the Fall 2020 semester we can also support instructors through Asynchronous KUWC Workshops, which include a voice-over video (with captions) of material we would normally present in the classroom, along with copies of informational handouts and activities related to the presentation topic. We are also happy to support instructors with writing assignment development and questions about responding to student writing.
