### FREN 431 Digital Humanities Project

#### Digital Humanities Project (20% of final grade) = 100 points total

This will be a scaffolded group project using the online tool *Story Maps*. As a group choose an overall topic that interests you and that you want to do research on. Each student of the group will be responsible for one Francophone region. You may choose any Francophone region, even those we did not talk about in class. Each group will present their work to the class at the end of the semester. Presentations should be 40 min. for a group of three; 30 min. for a group of two, etc. Topics have to be approved following an individual meeting with the instructor.

#### **Objectives**

- 1. Teach the class about a topic related to the Francophone world
- 2. Do cross-cultural analysis by comparing several cultural areas, identifying similarities and differences
- 3. Build research and critical thinking skills
- 4. Demonstrate acquired knowledge and present it to peers in a clear and structured way
- 5. Work creatively with digital tools
- 6. Work in a team

#### Scaffolding:

#### By October 8th

In class: Details of assignment and goals, scaffolding; form groups; brainstorming for topics

#### October 17<sup>th</sup>

Choice of topic and regions; meeting with instructor to approve topic, distribution of tasks (5 points); chose a date of presentation

#### October 31st

Meeting with librarian to obtain at least 4 sources per student (at least two of them in French; at least two scholarly sources); it is the student's responsibility to make an appointment (5 points). Please see contact information below and use sheet provided on blackboard.

#### November 7<sup>th</sup>

In-class training in *Story Maps* with Rhonda Houser (5 points)

#### November 9th

Each student submits title of presentation, 100-word abstract of their part of the presentation, and the four sources (5 points).

#### November 12<sup>th</sup>

In-class time for group work and feedback.

#### November 19th

Groups submit outline; images and text elements on BB "Group" feature (5 points).

## November 26<sup>th</sup>

In-class time for group work and feedback.

## November 28th, 30th and December 3rd

Presentations (70 points)

## December 6<sup>th</sup>

Evaluation by students (5 points); use document provided on BB

#### **Presentation Guidelines**

Presentation in French;

Don't read your presentation;

5 min. Common Introduction (what, why, how);

5 min. Common Conclusion (comparison: similarities and differences; what did you learn);

Each student has to talk for 10 min.;

Two out of the four sources per student have to be in French;

Two out of the four sources per student have to be scholarly;

Use of audio-visual material mandatory;

Video clips no longer than 2:00 min.;

Only Francophone regions
