- b) Who is speaking? [Hint: the speaker is in disguise].
- c) Whose name should go in the blank? [Hint: this character is also referred to as "the king" and "him" throughout the passage].

## 2. The following passage comes from Book 4 of Apollonius' Jason and the Golden Fleece.

When the young girl had thought this all over in her mind, her heart was wracked by violent waves of bitter pain. Straightaway she called [him] aside, away from his companions, and when they were far from the others she addressed these words of lamentation to his face: "What, son of Aison, is this plan you have devised about me? Has your success made you completely forgetful? Do you care nothing for all you said when hard pressed by necessity? Where are your oaths by Zeus, protector of suppliants? Where have all the sweet promises gone? It was these which made me abandon my homeland, the reputation of my house, and even my parents, everything which was important to me! This is not how I should have behaved—from shameless desire!"

- 2b) Whom is the speaker addressing? (hint: who is the son of Aison?)
- 2c) To what <u>plan</u> is the speaker referring? (in other words, what is the speaker worried about here?)
- 2d) Briefly comment on the <u>oaths</u> to which the speaker refers; that is, briefly discuss the implications that this oath had for both the speaker and the addressee.

- d) Why has "the king" tried to imprison the speaker of this passage?
- e) BRIEFLY describe how the speaker gets revenge upon "the king" at the end of this work.
